UUCS Approves Purchase of Munsel Strip

On Sunday, November 1, a special meeting of the UUCS Congregation approved purchase of a 40-foot strip of land just east of our current property line. The strip extends from behind our garden shed 342 feet south to the south edge of the Munsel property; their southern property line is an extension of our own.

The price for the strip is \$25,000; UUCS bears other costs of the transaction, which may total about \$5000. The purchase will be completed as soon as the paperwork can be done; soon after that, the fence now separating the Munsel property from ours on those 342 feet will be moved to the new boundary.

The reason to buy this strip of land is to give us more flexibility in the future: (1) to extend our RE wing toward the east, and (2) as a possible septic drain field if/when ours fails. Both of those options are some years in the future; we needed to buy the strip now from the Munsels before they sell their property and move to Hermiston.

UUCS has pledged that will cover the purchase price and associated costs. **George Struble**, who led the campaign for those pledges, thanks those who stepped forward to provide options for our future. George also thanks **Barry Halgrimson**, who worked with the Munsels and did many tasks over many months to bring the project to its current state.

UUCS members are invited to a fence-moving party on a date yet to be determined, but within the next two weeks. If you could join the party for a few hours, please tell Barry Halgrimson at 512-948-8842 or George Struble at 503-364-3929.

Thanks to all who voted in favor of the motion, and to those folks who pledged nearly \$30,000 to cover the purchase (Kay Young gave us a great kickstart), and to pay for the legal fees (our John Gear), surveying (our John Gorman), additional short-term site prep (our Skip Gosser), and filing fees with Marion County. I also want to thank Rev. Rick who has maintained a good relationship with the Munsels over the years and saw the potential benefit in expanding our footprint when he learned that they were moving. George Struble wisely suggested we avoid becoming landlords and buy just the 40 foot strip. George and Elsa also provided bridge financing so that we could write the check immediately and collect on the pledges at our leisure.

Most of all, I'd like to thank Dave and Kathy Munsel for years of quiet Sunday mornings, grazing sheep and ponies nibbling shoots of grass offered through the fence by hundreds of delighted RE kids, and for making this transaction possible. "Love Thy Neighbor", for UUCS, has been a piece of cake, and we wish them years of happiness and good health in their new Hermiston home.

Reverential Ramblings

Imagine this scenario. I have a brief encounter with some folks who are interested in joining our congregation – and they would fit right in. They want to know the usual things – what do we believe, what happens here on Sundays, etc.

Well, I can't say what "we" believe because we're decidedly non-creedal (no "official doctrines or creeds") – each one of us has the freedom of conscience to embrace the beliefs that are personally meaningful. I could say that we're "covenantal" instead of creedal, but trying to explain what that means would require a full bore sermon, and I don't want to bore these folks.

I could tell them about our Purposes and Principles which would help them understand the lofty ideals of UUism, but maybe not so much about who we are as a congregation. I could share our vision and mission statement, but for such practical purposes it's a wee bit wordy.

Congregations adopt vision and mission statements (as we did some years ago) to provide a reminder of their essential reason for being. Some of us in leadership positions are not so sure that our eloquent and lofty vision and mission statements achieve that purpose. As board chair LJ Frederickson notes: "They have to be short" and ours are not. By the way, do you know them? Hint: they are somewhere in this newsletter.

In search of inspiration, LJ has perused the websites of dozens and dozens of UU congregations and comes back from her explorations with this report of an oft expressed statement she has found: "The UU Congregation (whichever one it is) changes lives." That's it. Pretty simple and to the point.

Yet, I think that wording actually misses the point just a bit. The assertion that UU congregations "changes lives" implies that we have some preconceived notion of how particular lives need to be changed and then we do that for folks – sort of like a spiritual version of Oil Can Henry's: "Come on in and get your life changed." I do agree that a transformed life is often a happy and desirable result of life in a UU congregation, yet the change begins from within. Our role as a congregation is to create auspicious conditions for such change to occur, to be the fertile soil, sunshine and nourishment in which individuals are most likely to experience spiritual growth. In my view, everything we do in our ministry has that goal implicitly in mind.

Some folks reading this may have just gotten tripped up by that word "spiritual." The word does not necessarily connote faith in metaphysical realms. Spirituality is simply about discovering connections – with one's true self, with other people and beings, the world around you, your highest ideals, the sacred. You can be a spiritual atheist, theist, pantheist, deist, or agnostic.

The opposite of spiritual is "atomized." That is, feeling as though you are a lonely, disconnected atom adrift in a vast meaningless world with no bonds of affection or kinship – a lost soul. We congregate to counter such painful isolation. ***If I had to sum it up I'd say "our mission is to create opportunities to experience spiritual connection."*** And when we do experience this, our lives ARE changed. Whether we discover spiritual connection through our worship services, our covenant and other spiritual growth groups, our life lines lay ministry, our children's and youth religious exploration, social action and social service or fellowship opportunities we are about the business of creating conditions so that our lives may change in life affirming ways. May it be so!

Lifespan Religious Exploration

I always **welcome November** with my favorite poem that has many attached memories of adorable children playing this game with me. Most recently, it is a memory of the faces of my grandchildren playing this with a handful of real leaves (cut paper ones work great, too!). Enjoy making your own memories with this action poem and use the best inclusive pronouns you see fit when telling:

*The leaves are turning colors, (point to all of the changing leaves on the trees)
Yellow, Red and Brown (hold up all the colors for everyone to see)
And when Mr., (Mrs., Ms., The,) Autumn wind comes by (hesitate to build anticipation)
He (she/it/etc.) blows them all down! (kids throw the leaves all over in the air!)*

In our Religious Exploration program, we often take time during our time together to look out at the beautiful scenery of nature happening right outside our windows. At times, we can be heard walking in a circle or walking through the garden singing: *Now I walk in Beauty, Beauty is before me, Beauty is behind me, above and below me.* This is a Navajo Prayer Song they have learned.

We have encouraged the children to take time to notice nature around them, such as the birds flying by while they walk or ride to school, or watch for the leaves to change colors or for them to return. Recently someone came on Sunday and shared with me about the squirrel they watched while going to school! It is easy for all of us to get caught up in the days' activities and forget to take that deep breath and really see the world around us. When we take time to marvel at the leaves changing colors or the beautiful hawk sitting on the post as we drive to work or out for an errand, it is much easier to feel the interconnectedness of the world of which we are all a part, if we take time to "see" and "connect". Our seventh principle can come to life right before our eyes, IF we take time to notice.

Asking you if these following situations have ever happened to you before may put this idea of realizing that if you really consciously take time to be aware of nature around you, more often than not, you will be seeing so much more nature as you go through your day. So, have you ever liked a certain car or gotten a new car and all of a sudden you see that exact type of car everywhere you go, yet you have never really noticed them at all before? Or, once you decide to be looking for a new house to buy or rent, you all of a sudden see all kinds of For Sale and For Rent signs that you were sure were never there before? It seems, when you connect yourself to an awareness of something specific, you really see it and become more aware. See if this idea works for you and your families and enjoy all of the beautiful things before you, above and below!

Happenings and Highlights

Splinters from the Board: October Board Meeting

The title is resurrected from Tom Lancefield's newsletter reports of Board meetings a few decades ago. Thanks, Tom, for letting me use it again.

The Rev. Rick addressed our processes for staff performance reviews. Jo Nathan of our Personnel Committee will work with Rick and staff on this; reviewing our shared ministry is also an important and valuable process that is difficult to do well.

David Jeffers and Mary Gear are preparing to lead the November 14 workshop of UUCS leaders on transition from a pastoral to a programmatic church. This could be one of those crucial events in the life of our congregation. Participants are reminded: **read the two books:** *Moving on from Church Folly Lane* by Robert Latham and *Raising the Roof* by Alice Mann,

Short items: (1) Chad Halsey is appointed Acting Social Justice chair. (2) George Struble will provide a quarterly investment report to the Board. (3) Because of family responsibilities, Chris Vogel has withdrawn from leading our stewardship campaign this year; Phil Carver will lead the campaign.

Much of the meeting focused on purchase of a strip of the Munsel property just east of the church. The main outcomes were (1) Board authorization to purchase, contingent on a favorable vote at a November 1 special meeting of the Congregation, (2) call for that November 1 meeting, and (3) authorization for George Struble to conduct a campaign to raise pledges to pay for the purchase (the pledges are to be contingent on the actual purchase), (4) acceptance of a no-interest bridge loan to be used for purchase while pledges are

collected. Of course, much more has happened since that meeting October 8; see reports elsewhere in this newsletter!

Mississippi Flag: Does it Belong in "Walk of Flags" Park?

As reported in the October mid-month edition of this newsletter, the UUCS Social Justice in Action Team (SJAT) was working on a petition in response to the October 18 sermon by Intern Minister Theresa Soto and her guest, Teressa Raiford of [Don't Shoot Portland](#). That sermon focused on the experiences of black Oregon citizens and the discrimination they face. One of the actions that Theresa and Teressa requested of the SJAT was to come up with a petition asking our Oregon lawmakers to take down the Mississippi flag, which currently flies on the Oregon Capitol grounds. The Mississippi flag contains the Confederate Battle flag in its design. Many black Oregonians, and others, view this flag as a racist symbol. Senator Peter Courtney, the leader of the Oregon State Senate, has postponed a decision about removing the flag. This delay is unacceptable to some and the petition asks for immediate action.
