### **Inspiration from the Past**

We will soon be focusing as a congregation on the level of our annual giving to UUCS.

It's truly amazing how the previous generations of our congregation had the vision and commitment to provide us with the spiritual home we enjoy today. They found the means to also grace it with art that has significant meaning for each of us, such as the stained glass that enhances our sanctuary. It was truly a gift of love--a gift that we should embrace as an inspiration as we make our own generous pledge decisions.

In 2017 issues of *The Chalice and The Flame*, George Struble described the acquisition of the land and construction of the present church building. He noted that the church was originally constructed using clear window glass. To the large outer protective window was soon added the beautiful stained glass window that we enjoy today.

Local stained-glass artists were asked for proposals. Several of the local artists shared that they had learned from Gary Swanson, located in Mill City. "The Building Committee made the easy choice to go with the master." The actual design of the finished window was a collaboration of ideas from the committee and from Swanson.

The final design and color combination put the Chalice at the center of attention. Gary recalls, "My memory of the project is that this was an exceptional group of people to work with. There was a great amount of dialogue regarding design, color choices and all of it was done with no personal agendas, totally a collaborative effort." The total cost of the contract was \$15,900. In today's market the window would cost in excess of \$22,000, as the finished design contained 187.5 square feet of work.

The impact of the stained glass transcends the simple design of the sanctuary, making it a more receptive place. Sitting in the sanctuary, gazing up, the pieces of this kaleidoscope create a magnificent whole. Isn't this also the nature of our UU community? To this day, I find inspiration each time I spend a few minutes here.

Rev. Rick recalls, "I remember as they were installing the window, piece by piece, how you could only see the big picture when everything was in place. Then we were in awe—what a glorious window!" One of his favorite views of the stained glass is during the winter at night while driving down Cordon Road. He can't resist a quick glance up through the barren trees in Bateman Woods to see the beautiful stained glass glowing brightly in the darkness.

Today we're inspired by the generosity of those who had the vision to go beyond maintaining the status quo. We can embrace their creative aspirations in our own giving during the upcoming funding effort. Hopefully, we will each find a way to increase our giving to help fund some of our aspirations as well as the current financial needs of our congregation.

### ~ Rev. Richard Davis, UUCS's minister

A few years ago, it was my honor to preach the sermon at the installation of the Rev. Lise Adams Sherry as the minister of the First Parish of Norwell, Massachusetts (Unitarian Universalist). (Previously, Lise served as our Associate Minister and Director of Religious Exploration.) First Parish was founded in 1642—quite a historical stretch for a congregation on the North American continent!

In preparation for my remarks, I did a bit of research and read about the many ministers who served them through the centuries. One of their earlier clergy was truly a major league slacker who, more often than not, was scandalously derelict in his ministerial duties. I found it reassuring to read about him — he set a such a low bar for ministry that I felt like a champ by comparison. Any delusions of grandeur were soon dispelled when I read about the minister who served First Parish in the 1830's—The Rev. Samuel J. May. (You've often heard me speak about him. In October he was inducted into the "Abolitionists Hall of Fame.")

I am currently reading May's remembrances of his abolitionist activities from 1830 till the outbreak of the Civil War, and it is humbling to learn about his courageous and committed activism, not only in the abolitionist movement but also in educational reform and woman's rights, not to mention that he was a beloved minister wherever he served.

May expanded our vision of what it meant to be a Unitarian. He was an effective and faithful steward of our free faith religious heritage who helped make us stronger and more inclusive. Knowing of his example inspires and challenges me to be as good a steward of our congregation as I can, although I'll fall short of his example.

Yet, what truly amazed me as I read through the history of this congregation with its succession of a vast range of clergy types was how this relatively small institution persevered throughout – that it has had such rock-solid strength and durability through four centuries and continues to do quite well these days. It was good for me to realize anew that a congregation survives and thrives primarily because of the sacrifice and dedication of beloved members and friends.

For UUCS, young as we are (founded in 1949), there are nonetheless so many, now gone, who belonged, supported, gave and sacrificed for our spiritual home, which was for them the repository of their highest hopes and holiest aspirations and a vehicle through which they could bless the community and the world.

Today it is our turn—we are the stewards of this beloved congregation which embodies our highest and holiest values. This vital role is currently entrusted to us, as it was entrusted to those who came before us and will be entrusted to those yet to come. Stewardship can be done well or done poorly or indifferently. Each member choses, consciously and unconsciously, wittingly and unwittingly, year by year, generation by generation whether and how they will bless the community. And judging by what I am seeing these days you are choosing wisely and well. In so many amazing ways you are helping to "build beloved community and heal a hurting world." Thank you for being such good stewards. I love the way the American philosopher William James framed it: "the greatest use of a life is to spend it for something that will outlast it."

My hunch is that as much good as you may be doing, most are not aware of the full extent of the good our congregation is doing collectively, which is why I urge you to attend the Annual Congregation Appreciation Dinner where you will get the opportunity to see the big picture and also, to have a good meal and great fellowship and some fun. Please do come so we can all be together as one!

#### **Now Hiring An Office Assistant**

We are in the process of recruiting and hiring an Office Assistant for UUCS. This year will bring some changes to our office staff. As part of this transition, we are looking to hire a temporary Office Assistant who will help us over the next three months. This person will help assure that the office continues to provide the services that many have come to rely upon. This is a part-time position, 15 hours a week. Depending on what happens in the next three months this position does have the possibility of becoming more permanent.

The Office Assistant is the first point of contact for visitors and congregants and provides clerical and administrative support to the staff as well as to the lay leadership of the congregation. Essential functions include the following: creating and editing documents; managing online email communication and announcements; managing the congregation's membership database; supporting financial data entry and financial/bookkeeping. The Office Assistant supports the mission and vision of the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Salem Starting wage is \$12.40 to \$16.80 an hour depending on experience. PFLAG (the extended family of the LGBTQ community) meetings will begin on February 11 and are scheduled on the second Monday of every month. Michael Pollard is the SJAT liaison for the meetings.

Members have been busy in January attending HCAO [Health Care for All Oregon?] meetings, the LNG pipeline hearing at the Veteran Affairs building, the 3rd annual Women's March in downtown Salem, and the Martin Luther King Rally at North High School.

There are several opportunities for congregational involvement in February. Lobby for Clean Energy Jobs occurs on February 6 at the Elsinore and at the Capitol. ### **Update and Information on Congregations Helping People**

Congregations Helping People (CHP) is a local non-profit that assists local people in need. Specifically, CHP focuses much of its resources on keeping people from becoming homeless. CHP is also able to help with services like replacing a birth certificate or ID card, or even the occasional gas voucher, especially when the assistance can help people find employment. UUCS, among other Salem area churches, was a founding church of CHP in 2006. In 2018 and other recent years, UUCS has donated a portion of the Christmas Eve Service collection to CHP.

In 2018, with the help of City of Salem grants, 18 local churches, and individual donations, CHP was able to assist people in the local area with more than \$143,000.

2018 was also a year of change for CHP with long-time employee Tiffany Ottis leaving and CHP hiring new employee Alan LaFleur to assist our clients. Alan has been great, but his employment was always intended to be temporary and he will be moving on as of February or March 2019.

Another way you can help CHP is by joining our all-volunteer Board of Directors, or even spending a few hours each week helping people who come to CHP needing assistance. 
