Sign Our Petition to the UUA on Sundays in January

We, the UUCS Committee on Ministry, have written a public statement addressed to the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) and the Unitarian Universalist Ministers Association (UUMA) concerning their censure of Rev. Todd Eklof.

Our statement was generated by Committee-facilitated discussions held in the Fall of 2019. Each discussion focused on aspects of Rev. Eklof's book, *Gadfly Papers*. As these discussions concluded, members indicated an interest in taking action to address the censure of Rev. Eklof.

The proposed public statement is the result of the collective thoughts from the Committee on Ministry. We ask that you read the statement and plan to attend the special congregational meeting to approve sending this statement to UUA and UUMA, as required by our Bylaws. The meeting date will be on March 1, following the service.

Recently, I was having a conversation with a young woman who envisions buying a condo in an area back east in a thriving, diverse neighborhood she has discovered. A computer was at hand so I suggested we look up future projections of sea level rise to see how it might affect this area. Alas, it doesn't look good. She'll need to do more research into this, but now she lives with the gloomy thought that her dreams may get inundated. How I regret that for the first time in history future generations must live with the awareness that the world we know is truly passing and what is to come will be harsh and hard for many to bear.

Even as she must now recognize and accommodate the realities of climate change into her future plans, so must we. The way we're living on this planet is unsustainable. Yet even as we individually recognize the gravity of this situation we have yet to muster the collective will to do much about it. This is the great moral, spiritual, political, psychological, and technological challenge of our time – perhaps the greatest of all time. What we do or don't do in response to our looming climate crisis in this coming decade will be pivotal. To begin, we must do everything we can to prevent the re-election of the president who is in complete denial about this threat and perversely undoes recent efforts to heal our environmentally abused world.

Recently I observed such abuse in motion: last spring I was relaxing on the back porch of the house of a friend who lives in rural Maryland. Suddenly he noticed a bright green flying insect – an emerald ash borer – an invasive insect that has destroyed tens of millions of ash trees and threatens to wipe out the entire species. My friend knew about this infestation, before the emerald ash borers spread to his region and he's been diligent about protecting the large ash tree in his back yard. When the arborist came by to protect the tree from infestation, he noted that this large beautiful ash tree providing shade over my friend's backyard was the last one thriving in the region. He told us of other types of trees that are likewise endangered – predictions are that we will lose forty per cent of our forests in North America. My friend commented that "it feels like we're living in the end times."

Yes, it can feel that way. Feelings are important but they can also lead you astray if you don't know how to manage them (not claiming to be an expert in that regard myself).

Here's a quote that helps me spiritually recalibrate during these unsettling times: "I arise in the morning torn between a desire to improve the world and a desire to enjoy the world. This makes it hard to plan the day." (E.B. White).

This is a good reminder to seek some balance. Yes, do ALL you can to work with others to address this great challenge of our time. Yet if in so doing you find yourself living under a cloud of gloom then you are neglecting to enjoy and cherish the great gift of life. A failure to practice appreciation and gratitude for this most amazing life that we now share is a sin* (*which means "to miss the mark.") Let that one sink in.

So, I thoroughly enjoyed my visit with my friend, who lives in an old 19th century chestnut log cabin. Such chestnut trees were wiped out years ago by a blight, but recently I read that scientists and arborists are optimistic that they can introduce a blight resistant chestnut. You never know what's possible.

Worship Team Update

The Worship Team ended 2019 with a lovely spiritual service held Christmas Eve and then a Celebrating Community Potluck/Service held December 29. May we be bold and courageous to chart that new future". Habitat and Hope Update

Several important developments since our report in December:

- 1. We have received our tax-exempt status (501 (c) (3), to be technical.) We applied in November, and were warned that approval could take up to 18 months. This status means we can accept tax-deductible contributions directly; it also changes the report forms we must send to the IRS and the State of Oregon.
- 2. Our estimate is that the cost of construction, including water well and septic system, will be \$250,000. We have received pledges from the H&HV Board for \$60,000.
- 3. Our Board has adopted a target of construction late this summer. This is ambitious, and may not be possible, but we will try!
- 4. We plan to submit a grant proposal to the Oregon Community Foundation in January.

But there are many other important steps ahead. Any offers of help are welcome; contact Paul Wilson, Larry Nasset, John or Patty Davenport, Joe Dabek, or George Struble.

Is Our UUCS Microfinance Project Making a Difference?

Thanks to the generosity of our congregation, we raised a total of \$5,680 during the month of November 2019 from direct contributions, Share the Plate and Basha/Northern Lights ticket sales. This fundraising effort, combined with \$5,000 that we received back from Laos earlier this year, will allow us to contribute \$10,000 to the NEO Fund for microfinance projects in Nicaragua and India. We also hope to have another project in Peru funded from our remaining funds.

Do our micro-loans make a difference for the poor? Meet Johanna, from the Villa Vallarta neighborhood of Managua, Nicaragua. For years she sold soup on the street. Income for her family of six was about \$430 per month. In early 2018, desperate to increase her income, Joanna decided to take a loan from the NEO Fund, the first of 4 which she has taken and repaid. In October 2019 her income had increased to \$1,948 per month.

Do micro-loans make a difference for the poor? Absolutely! In Joanna's own words, "I used to sell a little before, but because of the NEO Fund – because of the loans – my business has increased and I am grateful!"
