

20th Anniversary of our Fellowship Hall

Our fellowship hall addition was built in 2003, so it is worthy of a celebration this year. And it makes a good story.

When we built our church in 1997, the plans included a fellowship hall, but we didn't have the money at the time. Instead, we included a small kitchen where the southeast corner of the current Hanneman Hall is, with access from the sanctuary. We were indeed happy with our new church, but we did see that we should add a fellowship hall as soon as we could.

That time came sooner than it might have. We had a mortgage on our building, and needed to pay it off before we could start thinking of new construction. When Laura Wells died in 1999, she left \$150,000 to UUCS. We used that to pay off the mortgage early, which meant that we could start raising money for the fellowship hall addition. When our second three-year capital campaign ended in 2000, we started a third, to raise money toward this project. Our dedicated members loyally pledged handsomely.

It became clear that sometime soon we would be able to build the fellowship hall, and we reconstituted the building committee. I so enjoyed the 1997 building project that I volunteered to chair the building committee again and was grateful that the Congregation appointed me as well as Steve Ovens, whose job at Willamette University meant that he knew much more about construction than any of the rest of us ever would. Of course, Barbara Hanneman, our remaining charter member from 1949 and beloved by all, was on the committee, and sometime in 2002 our Board voted to name the addition Hanneman Hall in her honor. We reengaged Craig Carlson, whose architectural work on the original church was such a success. We built essentially what had been on his plan in 1996, with one exception: we had found that we wanted a larger foyer, so we moved its front wall north to enlarge the foyer. Yes, the front wall was lifted by crane, placed on new footings, and floor, foyer walls and ceiling were extended to meet the wall!

We had a fourth capital campaign in February and March of 2003. Our congregation was growing weary with nine years of contributing toward the two phases of the building, and now we needed a "boost-up" campaign after the regular campaign finished. We had a strong and dedicated congregation, who came through. All the supporters from those years should feel very proud of their participation, both financially and with their labor; I believe they do!

We had had such a good experience in 1997 with our contractor, Elliott-Sheets, that asking for bids on the addition did not make sense. We knew who our contractor should be! So, Joe Sheets worked with us as we got ready to build. Our partnership with them worked just as well as it had in 1997. Even better because we didn't have to feel our way into it. Elliott-Sheets assigned the same foreman, Bob Palmer, who had worked so well with us in 1997.

The groundbreaking was April 20 – Easter! The project was finished in November, and dedicated December 7. As in 1997, our congregation had done all the painting, the *daily* cleanup, and the landscaping. Not only did that save money; the building belonged to each of us in a very personal way! Steve Ovens and I acted together as "owners' representative" to the architect and contractor; Steve had the expertise, but I had the time and did spend most of the day every day on site. I even got to lug wheelbarrows of concrete.

One Stop Donating

Every month a percentage of each Sunday's service offering is shared with a local nonprofit, which is commendable. However, those nonprofits touch a fraction of those in need of help. I feel UUCS can and should do better than sharing a percentage of the Sunday service collection. But how can UUCS be better at helping those in need? The choices as I see them are congregational projects helping the needy, empowering individuals, or doing both. Common to all is identifying needs. Talking with social service organizations about the needs of their clients and identifying needy individuals and families is time consuming. If there was only a single point of contact...

There is! It is the Marion County Community Resource Network, of which I became aware as I was writing this month's social justice newsletter article. Working through them will provide UUCS many opportunities to help those in need. Network members include schools, churches, businesses, Ford Family Foundation, Salem Health, several Marion County government departments, courts, several Mid-Willamette Valley Community Action Agency programs including ARCHES, and many more organizations. When our application is approved UUCS congregants can sign up to become members of the Marion County Resource Network as members of UUCS. After it is approved, "This Week at UUCS" will mention that we are members.

Hopefully, UUCS's website will say something about our membership in the Community Resource Network. I'd like to hear your ideas on how we can use the Community Resource Network to help the needy. Send me an email at sit@uusalem.org.

Splinters from the Board

At the July meeting, the UUCS board received a report on the UUA General Assembly (GA) that occurred at the end of June. There is much more information on this subject in past Chalice and Flame newsletters. The Article 2 revisions received preliminary approval for the first round. There will be a further binding vote at the 2024 GA.

The board approved the creation of a new position: AV Lead Technician. This position will coordinate our AV services on Sundays and other events. It will be supervised by the music director.

Barbara Stebbins-Boaz was approved as the new chair of the Worship Team.

The board approved extending the current Strategic Plan from 2023 to 2025 to allow for the incorporation of the new Mission and Vision statements.

The board approved the spending of \$170,000 for installation of AC throughout the building using a heat pump system. It will be paid for from donations specifically dedicated to this project and other reserve funds as needed.

The board discussed the possible use of the north parking lot for up to 5 recreational vehicles managed by Church in the Park (homeless housing). As new information is gathered, the board will continue the discussion. The congregation will be advised as plans continue.

A new five-year lease was negotiated with Kaleidoscope Community School.
