Several years ago, I surveyed a room full of my ministerial colleagues and asked how many of them had had nightmares wherein they suddenly found themselves in the pulpit on a Sunday morning facing their congregations, only to realize that they were woefully ill prepared and/or ill clad for this occasion. Every hand in the room went up, save one, and I was heartened to learn that I was not alone in this. In my last such dream some years ago I suddenly found myself in the pulpit on some high occasion with distinguished guests in attendance and I had no sermon to offer, and I was wearing raggedy clothes. It didn't look good for me, yet then my dreaming self took the bull by the horns, and I honestly confessed to everyone: "Sorry, I'm not prepared today—I guess I blew it—so, let's just make the best of it". Once I spoke those words an oppressive dread was lifted and I realized that although this was far from an ideal situation, I would make it through thanks to the congregation's tolerance and understanding. In this dream you were a dream congregation.

You're welcome to interpret this dream however you will, but for me it signaled a psychic shift wherein I realized "I'm not in this all alone and I don't have to be perfect, just authentic."

Then, some years later, I experienced another psychic shift that naturally followed from this. I had long been troubled by the recognition that in one respect I was mostly alone in that my ministerial voice was often heard from our pulpit and your voices were too seldom heard. I do strive to make mine a representative and unifying voice. But still, something important was missing—your authentic voices, your wisdom, your sacred yearnings, your pains and sorrows and struggles were too seldom heard and acknowledged. So, I resolved to do all I could to end the ministerial monopoly of the pulpit at the UU Congregation of Salem.

Thus began our unique "Homilists and Storytellers Ministry" (*I've never heard of any other congregation that has such a program.*) A solid core of you joined, went through our training and orientation, and were ordained into this ministry of the spoken word.

Now, when I am not speaking from the pulpit, you will often hear one of our own homilists. This empowers and enriches us. To ensure that this ministry thrives and continues at UUCS we resolved to renew and refresh our Homilists and Storyteller program every two years when ongoing members would once again participate in our training and potential new members could join us.

Our **next homilists training and orientation** will be held on four successive Saturday mornings, January 27, February 3, 10 and 17, from 10 to noon. Please give it serious consideration. Attendance at the training will give you more time to explore before you make a commitment.

Joining me in leading this training is my good friend and colleague the Reverend Craig Moro, who has spoken here dozens of times over the years and has much wisdom to share. The training material largely derives from the lectures and books written by the teacher who introduced me to the subtle arts of crafting a sermon, Dr. Fred Craddock, who Newsweek Magazine rightly regarded as "one of the top preachers in the English-speaking world." I am forever indebted to him and pay him back by paying it forward.

Finally, on another note entirely, please see the announcement elsewhere in the newsletter inviting you to our **reception** on Saturday, December 23 at 3 pm for my son Zach and his new wife Emily.

Another way to put this is to say, mysterious things change how we feel. Mystery transforms us! When we feel life is boring, they

make us feel that life is exciting. When we feel like a know-it-all, they make us humble and curious. These are all important lessons that are essential to your child's religious education.

On October 31, 2023, the UUA's Article II (two) Study Commission released its final version of the proposed revision of Article II of the UUA's bylaws, which can be seen by <u>clicking here</u>. This version will soon be presented to the UUA Board of Trustees for approval and, if approved (as expected), it will then be presented to the delegates at the June 2024 General Assembly for a final vote. Social Justice News

Increasingly, the weather is becoming more extreme. The weather is becoming warmer, colder, drier, damper, and windier. Weather is seen as something that happens and we have no influence over it. That statement is both true and false. It's true that we cannot influence today's, tomorrow's, or next week's weather. It's false in that humans have no influence on the weather: our actions influence earth's climate which determines the weather we experience or will be experiencing. How can this be? Anything that changes the amount of energy received from the sun or radiated from Earth to space influences our climate.

Global warming, manifesting itself as climate change, has and will impact all of us. The most obvious impact of global warming is the increasingly frequent extreme weather events. What we haven't fully seen are the secondary impacts on water, food, and health. What we sacrifice today to address global warming will be miniscule compared to global warming's future impact.

Discussions about global warming often are indirectly about our standard of living, reducing the value of investments, or stranding corporate assets. Collectively, these are about people not wanting their standard of living reduced. We have been using Earth's energy savings, fossil fuels, to fund our standard of living without regard for pollution of our air and water and extreme weather events caused by using them. Those who benefit economically from producing and using fossil fuels have made global warming into a zero-sum game where they win, and we lose. It doesn't need to be that way.

Our efforts to reduce the impact of global warming start with living our principles individually and collectively. Through our principled efforts and collaboration, we can and will mitigate global warming.

Interim Ministry Group Board Report of November 11, 2023

The Board will hire an Accredited Interim Minister based on UUA recommended guidelines, will follow UUA search procedures in the UUA Transition Ministry Handbook and will hold monthly Board Forums to keep congregants informed and included.

The Transition Ministry group is working on beginning stages of the search, which include: compiling a documents package, updating the UUCS website page regarding Teams and Committees, referring budget considerations to the Finance Team for salary, benefits and moving expenses, and requesting that the by-laws be updated to state that the board conducts the search and hire of the Interim Minister and beginning contract considerations, including review of the current minister's contract.

The Search Process begins by notifying the UUA within 6 months of the start date, January 1. Per UUA guidelines, the search profile should be completed by mid-April 2024. Also, following UUA guidelines, the contract with the Interim Minister will provide for service for one year with the option to renew for another year.
