As I reflect on my upcoming retirement in just a few months and your pledge drive for next congregational year I am moved to say **thank you**—members and friends of UUCS—for your generous support of ministry during the past thirty-one years that I have served you. I was tempted to say "my" ministry, but it wasn't mine; it was, and is, our shared endeavor. Ministry is much more powerful and effective when it is shared and not a solo act.

Our shared ministry focuses on serving the common good, beginning within the congregational community and radiating outward. How many forms and expressions there are for this ministry!

Within our congregation we offer to one another our ministry of compassionate presence, our ministry to create and support interpersonal connections, our ministry to welcome and include newcomers, our ministry of the spoken word that serves remind us of the deepest meanings and highest purposes of our lives, our ministry of music that stirs the soul, and our ministry to support our precious children. Then, there is all the ministry that happens naturally, spontaneously when we gather.

Beyond our own congregational community, there is our ministry to families without shelter who stay in our spiritual home several times a year for a week at a time. There is also our support to the many kindred spirit organizations in the community with whom we share our weekly offering and those kindred spirit groups with whom we share our building.

Simply put, ministry means being a friend however you can, wherever you can, whenever you can—a loving, compassionate, supportive, encouraging friend to others. (That's why my bumper sticker says "Your Friend").

In just a few months "Your Friend" (i.e., I) will be driving off into the sunset of retirement and you will be looking to the future as you seek your next interim minister (who will be hired by the board of trustees to serve two years) and then your settled minister (who will be called by a vote of the congregation).

Ministerial transitions incur an extra level of expense for congregations—an expense you have been spared for over three decades (since you've been stuck with the same minister for that long).

Then, too, it will be good if your next ministers are warmly welcomed with generous financial support. Those who enter the ministry do not do so for the money, but it is important for congregations to offer generous support in order to attract those who can best serve.

This, then, truly *is* a time when an extra push is needed for this pledge drive to be a success. As it is, a relatively small number of devoted members give at extraordinarily generous levels and this enables us to support our shared ministry from year to year. Yet, as the years pass, so too do some of these most generous givers, and there is concern among some who wonder: "Who will take up the financial slack?"

Perhaps it will be you. Could it be? Should it be? As you consider the shared ministry we offer to one another and to our surrounding community, I invite you let the spirit of radical generosity stir in your heart.

You are a wonderful congregation, and I am deeply grateful for all of your support. Now I am excited because you have so much support to offer the next ones fortunate enough to serve as minister at the UUCS.

Final Vote on Article II Revision in June; Zoom Discussions February 7 and March 6

The final vote on the revision of the UUA's Article II of the Bylaws is coming up this June at the 2024 General Assembly (GA). Your delegates would like your assistance in determining how to vote. The UUCS Board will guide us. However, it is also important to hear from the congregation. You can help by sharing your thoughts.

First, read the latest revision of Article II by <u>clicking here</u>. An article entitled "History of Article II and the [Article II] Study Commission" can be found by <u>clicking here</u>. Search for more links to "Article II" on the <u>uua.org</u> website.

Second, click here to attend Zoom discussions on February 7 from 7 pm to 8 pm, or March 6 from 7 pm to 8 pm.

Third, be on the lookout for an in-person discussion in April and a chance to provide your "yea" or "nay" in May.

In brief, they are suggesting that the UUA replace its 7 Principles and 6 Sources that are in our hymnal and on the back of every Order of Service you get each Sunday. The replacement includes 6 Values supporting the centering value of Love. Those 6 Values are interdependence, equity, transformation, pluralism, generosity, and justice. In addition, there are ideas of inspiration, inclusion and freedom of belief. It's a bit more complicated than summarized here, which is why it would be so helpful for you to read it yourself and then join the chat on February 7 and or March 6. Thank you ahead of time for your support in our decision-making process.


Grant Writer Requested, Needed Soon!

UUCS has been informed by the Board of the Cascadia Growth Fund that there are Grants currently available in several areas. Some have a March 1st, 2024, application deadline. The Cascadia Growth Funds for Unitarian Universalism are aimed at four general areas of congregational life: 1. Building improvements and accessibility;

2. Mission-based initiatives related to ministry, purpose and vitality; 3. Technology and communications equipment and training and; 4. Initiatives among congregations such as collaborations, clusters, conferences, and workshops. The Story of Recent Pledging at UUCS

The average number of people who pledged over \$100 and the average number who paid over \$100 declined in the first years of pandemic, 2020 and 2021. They have increased, but not recovered to pre-pandemic levels.



The graph to the right shows how the total amount of money pledged to the church declined in the first 2 years of the pandemic. The amounts *pledged* have since rebounded but have not fully recovered. In contrast, the total amount *paid* to the church in pledges has gone down every year since

Data for total pledges paid in 2023-24, of course, is not yet available.

The left graph shows that the average pledges of a decreasing number of people who pledged more than \$100 in the first two years of the pandemic, went up slightly. The average amounts pledged, and average of those pledges paid have gone down a little since 2022. The average amount paid by the end of the most recent fiscal year, 2023, was \$2,038.

Overall takeaways: The main concern for UUCS's pledge behavior is that we have less income from pledges than we need to adequately support the current operations of the church. While there are other ways that UUCS brings in money, member support through pledges is crucial. Options to meet UUCS stewardship goals include increasing the number of pledgers as well as increasing the average amount pledged and paid.

Opportunities to support this goal: Return your <u>estimate of giving</u> early. Consider how your pledge aligns with the <u>Suggested Fair-Share Contribution Guide</u> pledge form. Social Justice News

The Social Justice Team is considering several areas where UUCS can make a difference in the lives of others. They are listed below with possible ways we can help. We can't do all of them; we need your help in identifying what is doable. There will be a social justice table, identified by the social justice lantern, in the Fellowship Hall after Sunday Service. We want to hear from you. Stop by and help us determine what can be accomplished. You can also comment on the items below by sending an email to sigt@uusalem.org.

We can **help the homeless** by offering our personal touch and humanity, partnering with other organizations who are helping and by supporting efforts to create affordable housing.

We can **work for immigrant justice** by educating the congregation on causes of mass immigration, which include environmental degradation, experiences of threats and violence and inability to earn a living wage in their countries of origin. Here, too, we can work with and assist other groups currently helping immigrants, such as Salem for Refugees. And we can advocate for fair treatment of immigrants by our country and communities.

Racial equity can be improved through building bridges, by extending hospitality to other groups and by working on projects with them. We can advocate for public policies that prohibit discrimination. At the same time, we can recognize that such policies alone will not change a person's heart. We can learn and educate others how we have benefited from the abilities, work and experiences of other races.

We can **further access to affordable healthcare** by advocating for and supporting public policies needed to make healthcare accessible and affordable. We can also learn about private equity and hedge fund investments in healthcare and why those investments are attractive to investors. We can assess the effects of consolidation and its impact on healthcare. And we can advocate for affordable pharmaceuticals.

We can **assist children living in poverty** by working with and support agencies that provide services to families and after school programs and advocating support for them. We can advocate for a living wage for all persons. UUCS might also consider a project of its own, such as volunteering to aid after school programs.

We can **help improve environment quality** and reduce global warming by supporting other groups and advocate for effective environmental policies. We can learn and inform others about reducing our environmental footprints. We can become master recyclers or master gardeners and encourage others to do so as well.

Splinters from the Board

Locking the front door after service Based on input from UUA, our Safer Congregations Committee, Hosts and others, the Board approved locking the front door 15 minutes after the start of the service on Sunday mornings. Hosts will monitor the door for latecomers. The door will be unlocked at the end of the service. As is required by building codes, all doors can be opened from the inside, so no one can get locked in the building.

Interim Minister search At every board forum and in every newsletter, there is an update on our progress toward finding an interim minister. The IM search group is Christine Ertl, Robert Galloway and Lynn Cardiff. This month we reported that we worked on a budget that will be needed to fund an interim minister. This has been discussed with the Finance Team and the Committee on Human Resources. We also have been putting together our UUCS profile which will be posted on our and UUA's website for potential interim ministers to see.

Congregational input regarding the interim minister The next two board forums are on Sunday, February 18 and March 17 at noon in the sanctuary. These will be devoted to gathering input from the congregation on questions such as what we want in an interim minister, and what do we want the minister to do to help us grow into our next phase as a congregation. There could also be many other questions discussed. Please put these dates on your calendar. All are invited to attend one of these sessions; there is no need to attend both.
